On behalf of the Dog Registrar, please remember to renew your dog and/ or cat license. All dog and cat licenses expired on December 31, 2020. The 2021 licenses will be sold beginning January 4, 2021. A grace period will be granted until January 31, 2021; after that date, a \$5.00 penalty per month will be assessed. Rabies vaccinations must be renewed for 2021 if the vaccination expires prior to November 1, 2021.

NO KNOCK Registration Ordinance.

There is a NO KNOCK Registration Ordinance in effect which allows you to register with my office to be placed on a NO KNOCK list so solicitors will not approach your home, if you choose. When an applicant applies for such a



license and if they are approved, they will be given a copy of the list (address only) of those who have registered. Hours have also been set for solicitation from 10:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. Please keep in mind that there are

organizations that are federally exempt from state and local regulations and can approach your home at hours other than what has been set. I will also be providing exempt organizations with the list of NO KNOCK registrants and ask for consideration. If you have already registered your property, you do not need to re-register.



Superintendent McNeil and Principal Romano, of Knollwood School, have graciously agreed to continue to support the "Be a Good Neighbor Snow Shoveling Program" for this winter.

The program is a cooperative effort between Knollwood School, the students and volunteer community members. Seniors currently on our list have been mailed a renewal form.

The ability to provide sufficient shovelers depends on the number of student volunteers who sign up (with parental approval). Seniors should <u>not</u> sign up if they can rely on a relative, friend, neighbor or if they use a contractor or will be out of town for a month or more during the winter.

The Committee is seeking additional volunteers and adult volunteers who can occasionally help with transportation to medical appointments or with small household tasks (i.e. changing a hard-to-reach light bulb or opening/closing a stuck window).

After Hours Drop Boxes

Tor your convenience, there is an After Hours Drop Box located in the vestibule of Borough

Hall. The box is affixed to the wall and is marked, BOROUGH HALL, AFTER HOURS DROP. The drop box is locked at all times and is checked on a daily basis.

This is a multi-use box where you may drop off forms, tax payments or correspondence for Borough staff.



In addition, there are multiple containers in the vestibule designated for several departments, Clerk's Office and Administration, Engineering, Zoning and Planning, Finance and Tax and Recreation.


The vestibule is open 24 hours, 7 days a week.

Garden Club Uses Technology to Showcase Workshops and Keep Members COVID Safe

The Garden Club of Fair Haven, like all clubs, has to limit member interactions because of the COVID virus. Through small group activities and technology, the club is successfully keeping their club spirit alive!

Being a member of the Garden Club of Fair Haven has many advantages, especially instructional workshops presented to the members. These workshops are lead by talented members who are floral design winners and master gardeners. The workshops are designed to educate the members and encourage participation in design and horticulture events.

Floral design competition is one of the activities of the garden club. Recently, experienced designers Cassy Abel



and Terry Simboli taught a workshop on Colonial American flower design from the years 1607-1720. The Grover House in Lincroft opened their doors to allow a small group of garden club members to take this workshop. The emphasis of the workshop focused on staging, requirements and fundamentals for Colonial American floral design. Two weeks later, the participants entered their designs in a judged competition that took place at the office of Doctor Chris Storti , a local chiropractor. National Garden Club Accredited Life Judge, Marina Kerber, critiqued the beautiful designs and gave positive feedback. The judging was video taped and shared with the entire membership on You Tube. Snow and Ice Removal from Vehicles and Sidewalks N.J.S.A. 39:4-77.1a – Failure to Remove Snow/Ice from Motor Vehicle



Each driver of a motor vehicle, operated on a street or highway in this State, shall have an affirmative duty to make all reasonable efforts to remove accumulated ice or snow from exposed surfaces of the motor



sonable efforts to remove accumulated ice or snow from exposed surfaces of the motor vehicle prior to operation. Surfaces shall include, but not be limited to, the hood, trunk, windshield, windows, roof of the



motor vehicle, the cab of a truck, the top of a trailer or semitrailer being drawn by a motor vehicle and the top of an intermodal freight container being carried



by an intermodal chassis. A person who violates the provisions of this subsection may be stopped on a street or highway by a law enforcement officer who

believes the accumulated ice or snow may pose




- a threat to persons or property regardless of whether any snow or ice is dislodged from the motor vehicle.

Borough Code 14-6.1 —Snow and Ice Removal Required; Time Limit.

The owner, tenant or occupant of any building or lands abutting upon any street within the Borough of Fair Haven shall cause the sidewalk in front of the property to be cleared of snow or ice to a width of at least two (2) feet within twenty-four (24) hours after the cessation of the snowfall or formation of ice. In case of ice on the sidewalk, should it be impracticable to remove same, then the sidewalk shall be covered with sand or some other suitable substance so as to cause the sidewalk to be made safe and convenient for persons traveling thereon.

Remember not to leave your vehicles in the street if there is a chance that it may snow. Also, if you have a corner property, it is your responsibility to shovel the sidewalk in front of your residence and on the side.
