## CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS ALL AROUND TOWN

Over the past ten years, the Mayor and Council have made much needed capital investments in the Borough's parks, roads, sidewalks and drainage/stormwater infrastructure. The majority of those projects were at least partially funded by various grants and additional Borough funding was bonded over the life of the investment, which has helped keep the Borough's tax rate stable.

The Mayor and Council will continue to invest in capital projects in a thoughtful and responsible manner by pursuing available grant funding to help offset the cost of all planned projects. Additionally, we will be taking advantage of low interest rates and our AA+ credit rating to fund capital improvements. Following is a brief synopsis of projects that have been recently completed or are scheduled to begin in 2021/2022.

**IMPROVEMENTS TO BATTIN ROAD** – This curb, sidewalk and road paving project is nearly complete and was fully funded by a \$350,000 New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) Grant.

**WATERFRONT INFRASTRUCTURE AND POCKET PARK PROJECT** - This project will make improvements to the drainage and bulkhead infrastructure at the end of Hance Road and Grange Avenue. Pocket parks will be installed, or improved, at both locations. The project also includes upgrades in and around the Borough's boat ramp at the end of Battin Road. The improvements to all three locations will increase viewing vistas and access to the Navesink River. This project is being partially funded by a \$250,000 Monmouth County Open Space Grant.

**BANK STABILIZATION AND LIVING SHORELINE IMPROVEMENTS AT THE END OF DENORMANDIE AVENUE** – This project is in the final plan and permitting phase. It is designed to protect the bluff from further erosion and improve access to the Navesink River.

**WATER MAIN UPGRADE ON RIVER ROAD FROM RUMSON TO RED BANK** – This project, which is being undertaken by New Jersey American Water (NJAW), will replace water mains all along River Road that are over eighty years old. The improvements will prevent future water main breaks and increase water pressure for surrounding homes and businesses.

**PAVING OF RIVER ROAD, RUMSON TO RED BANK** – This project will be undertaken by Monmouth County at the conclusion of the NJAW water main project.

**HARRISON AVENUE IMPROVEMENTS** - This curb, sidewalk, drainage and road paving project is in the planning stage and will go out to bid in late summer or early fall. It is being partially funded by a \$260,000 NJDOT Grant.

**RIVER ROAD STREETScape WEST** – This project, which is being fully funded by the Borough will complete our River Road Streetscape from Smith Street to the Red Bank border through the installation of curbs, sidewalks and decorative lighting. It is scheduled to be completed prior to the Monmouth County paving project referenced above.

**IMPROVEMENTS TO HANCE ROAD AND COONEY TERRACE** – This project is in the early planning stages and it will be partially funded by a \$250,000 NJDOT Grant.

**BOROUGH MICRO-PROJECTS, PHASE II** – This project, which will include drainage, curb and sidewalk improvements in a variety of locations throughout town, is scheduled to go out to bid in late spring. All the improvements are being fully funded by the Borough.

I realize that capital improvement projects do impact neighborhood traffic and travel throughout town, which is why all projects will be coordinated through our Police Department to minimize inconvenience and ensure safety. I am confident that the inconvenience will be temporary, while the improvements will last for many years to come. On behalf of the Mayor and Council, I thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

**WHAT IS STORMWATER POLLUTION?** Water from rain and melting snow that flows over lawns, parking lots and streets is known as stormwater runoff. This water, which travels along gutters, into catch basins and through storm drain pipes and ditches, usually is not treated, but then flows or is discharged into local waterbodies. Along the way, the stormwater picks up trash (fast-food wrappers, cigarette butts, styrofoam cups, etc.) and toxins and other pollutants (gas, motor oil, antifreeze, fertilizers, pesticides and pet droppings). This polluted stormwater can kill fish and other wildlife, destroy wildlife habitat, contaminate drinking water sources and force the closing of beaches because of health threats to swimmers.

Human activity is largely responsible for the stormwater pollution. Everything that we put on the ground or into the storm drain can end up in our water. Each of us has a responsibility to make sure these contaminants stay out of our water. **Whether we have clean water is up to you!**

Here are some simple guidelines to follow:

- **FOLLOW THE DIRECTIONS ON THE FERTILIZER BAG, DO NOT APPLY BEFORE IT RAINS AND USE ONLY WHEN NECESSARY.**
- **PROPERLY DISPOSE OF YOUR PET'S WASTE BY FLUSHING IT DOWN THE TOILET OR BY PLACING IT IN A BAG AND THROWING IT IN THE TRASH.**
- **RECYCLE USED OIL AT CERTIFIED FACILITIES AND MAINTAIN YOUR VEHICLE TO PREVENT LEAKS.**
- **TAKE YOUR CAR TO A CAR WASH WHERE THE WATER GETS TREATED AND RE-**

## FAIR HAVEN STREETLIGHTS TO BE UPGRADED TO LED TECHNOLOGY

At the Fair Haven Environmental Commission, our mission is to keep Fair Haven at the forefront of the most economic and environmentally advantageous technology, while making sure that these solutions work for our citizens.

Currently, we have three technologies: Mercury (bluish light), sodium (yellow light) and incandescent. For environmental safety, no new mercury lights can be installed. Yellow sodium lights are good in fog (same as your car's fog lights and the incandescent lights waste huge amounts of energy and are expensive (it is these we want to replace first). The 100 to 300 watt incandescents can be replaced by 50-90 watt LEDs which also are far more reliable with a much longer life and better lighting on the ground

We don't know what we don't know, so we are testing, soon, 12 new LED streetlights. JCP&L will install these at no charge to the Borough. We have chosen the sites (quiet residential streets, major pedestrian crossings, busy intersections, school crossings, etc.) to inform us how well they serve each condition and to help us choose the wattage levels. Fog, rain or a lovely moonlit night will all provide test beds. **WE ALSO WANT TO HEAR FROM OUR CITIZENS** on LED performance. Please contact me at [rww@monmouth.com](mailto:rww@monmouth.com) to relay your experiences and impressions. I will respond whenever necessary. After a year of assessment, or less, we will be prepared to properly upgrade the current 249 streetlights (49 incandescent) to better serve our residents.

## 10 Tips for Parents of New Drivers

**Tip #1: Be the example your children need.** If *you* refrain from using a cell phone while driving, buckle up your seat belt, respect others on the road and follow the traffic laws of your state, your teenager will follow your example.

**Tip #2: Choose the appropriate car.** A newer car may have better safety features and airbags than an older model. Larger cars offer more protection in a crash and your teen may be a bit less tempted to rev the engines for a race.

**Tip #3: Practice makes a (nearly) perfect driver.** No one becomes good at something after doing it for just a few hours. Your child needs at least two hours of practice driving each week for six months to reach a level of proficiency.



**Tip #4: Limit nighttime driving.** Reduced visibility at night makes nighttime driving much more challenging for inexperienced drivers.

**Tip #5: Have the impaired driving talk.** Talk with your child *before* he or she gets a license. If your teen were to consume *any* alcohol or other drugs before getting behind the wheel, they would be engaging in impaired driving. In addition to warning them about the risks of crashes and fatalities, make sure your child knows the legal and economic consequences of disobeying the law.

**Tip #6: The dangers of texting.** Hundreds of people die every month because a driver got distracted while behind the wheel. Teach your child to keep their eyes on the road and their minds focused.

**Tip #7: Prepare them for the weather.** Snow? Black ice? Heavy rains? Teach your child to know how to handle the common (and even uncommon!) situations that arise on the roads in your area.

**Tip #8: Don't drive while drowsy.** Fatigued drivers are dangerous drivers. Encourage your teen to balance their activities and get enough rest.

**Tip #9: Keep an eye on maintenance.** If your teenager knows how to test tire pressure, check essential fluids and change a flat tire, they'll be safer on the roadway.

**Tip #10: Use technology to your advantage.** Technology can allow you to monitor your teen's driving performance, to set speed alerts, radio volume limits, etc.

### HOME SECURITY:

With the warmer weather approaching, many homeowners will begin to open their windows and sliding doors to allow the fresh air into their homes. An open window or slider, especially on the first floor, is an easily accessible entry point for any burglar looking for an "easy score". ### **NO KNOCK Registration Ordinance.**

There is a NO KNOCK Registration Ordinance in effect which allows you to register with my office to be placed on a NO KNOCK list so solicitors will not approach your home, if you choose. When an applicant applies for such a license and if they are approved, they will be given a copy of the list (address only) of those who have registered. Hours have also been set for solicitation from 10:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. Please keep in mind that there are organizations that are federally exempt from state and local regulations and can approach your home at hours other than what has been set. I will also be providing exempt organizations with the list of NO KNOCK registrants and ask for consideration. If you have already registered your property, you do not need to re-register.
